Challenges in Flood Prone Areas</p>	<p><b>There was room for improvement in addressing issues in areas habitually affected by flooding.</b></p> <p>The Committee asked the MRDLG about its contingency plans for flood prone areas. The Ministry's initial written submission indicated the purchase of radios, public address systems and amphibious vehicles, as an aspect of flooding response efforts. The radios were purchased and the public address systems were awaiting approval.</p> <p>The amphibious vehicles, however, were not procured. Due to the considerable expense involved, of approximately three million (\$3Mn) per vehicle, in addition to the cost of training staff to operate the vehicles, the MRDLG did not allocate funding for this purchase. The MRDLG opted to use dingies instead. They are due to be placed throughout flood prone corporations. If the MRDLG purchases dinghies, it will consider an inflatable dinghy with a high density polythene and aluminium floorboard and an outboard engine, specifically for the following municipal corporations: Penal/Debe Regional Corporation, Tunapuna / Piarco Regional Corporation, Mayaro Rio Claro Regional Corporation, Sangre Grande Regional Corporation, Couva Tabaquite Talparo Regional Corporation, San Juan Laventille Regional Corporation (El Socorro, South) and Siparia Regional Corporation (Woodland) . The estimated total cost would be TT\$600,000.00</p>

Due to the high cost of acquisition and maintenance, as well as the fact that dinghies have been shown to be effective for shallow water rescues for civilian use, the MRDLG is not interested in purchasing amphibious vehicles at this time. The Fire Service and Coast Guard of Trinidad and Tobago are professional first responders in charge of search and rescue, including shallow and deep-water rescues.</p> <p>vi. The MRDLG will gladly collaborate with T&amp;TEC to bring impacted citizens to safety.</p>
