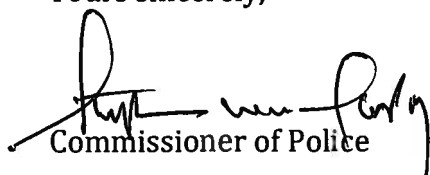

Head 64 – Trinidad and Tobago Police Service

I. Tagging of the Ministry's Inventory :

- **The Trinidad and Tobago Police Service was in the Process of tagging appliances and furniture using either stencil spray or carving machines. The TTPS advised that the tagging system used was outdated and it was considering using its barcode system which was exclusive to Information Technology equipment, for all inventory.**

Recommendations:

- ***The Department shall provide a Status Report to the Committee on the progress made in using the Barcode System as the primary means of tagging by June 30, 2017.***

Response

The Trinidad and Tobago Police Service continues to utilize stencil spray or carving machines to tag appliances and furniture. The barcode system which is used by the Information Technology Department has not yet been implemented generally.

Plans are being put in place for the barcode system to be implemented incrementally across the Trinidad and Tobago Police Service over the next six months.
