The Minister of Trade and Industry and Minister in the Ministry of Finance (Hon. Kenneth Valley): Mr. Speaker, I wish to inform the House that the Government is able to answer three out of the five questions for oral response on the Order Paper. They are questions Nos. 80, 123 and 128 and we are asking for a deferral of two weeks for the other two. I can ask for one week, but next Friday is a public holiday. That is why I am asking for two weeks.

**Natural Gas Pipeline
(Government's Policy)**

80. Mr. Ganga Singh (*Caroni East*) asked the hon. Minister of Energy and Energy Industries:

Could the Minister inform this House what is the Government's policy with respect to Government's proposal to build a pipeline to convey natural gas to several Caribbean islands? Could he further state:

- (i) whether a feasibility study is being conducted on this proposal?
- (ii) if the answer to (i) is in the affirmative, what organization is conducting this feasibility study?
- (iii) what is the cost thus far of this feasibility study and what is the final projected cost?

The Minister of Energy and Energy Industries (Hon. Eric Williams): This Government's policy in relation to the proposal to build a Caribbean natural gas pipeline is influenced by our intention to access all available regional markets for our natural gas and in so doing, assist with the development of the economies of the region, by making available to them a more competitively prized fuel. Government recognizes that it is in this country's interest to have strong, regional economies as trading partners.

To date, the Government has not commissioned a feasibility study for the Caribbean Pipeline Project. A pre-feasibility study was undertaken by EOG Resources and executed in mid 2002 by JP Kenny Incorporated, a reputable international consulting firm which presented a number of hypotheses for the project.

As indicated, in the response to question No. (ii), a feasibility study for the Caribbean gas pipeline has not been commissioned to date. The National Gas Company is now embarking on a request for proposals to initiate the study in the shortest possible time.

The estimated cost of the feasibility study is not available as no such study has been commissioned to date.

Mrs. Persad-Bissessar: Would the Minister be able to say what is the cost of the pre-feasibility study that he has done?

Hon. E. Williams: No, Mr. Speaker. That may be another question. Certainly, I would have to speak with EOG Resources, which is a private company that undertook the study.

**On-the-Job Training (OJT)
(Recruitment and Monetary Arrangements)**

123. Mr. Harry Partap (*Nariva*) asked the hon. Minister of Science, Technology and Tertiary Education:

- (a) Would the Minister state how many trainees were placed in the On-the-Job Training (OJT) Programme in 2002, in the public and private sector?
- (b) Would the Minister state what is the stipend paid to trainees by Government and by the private sector?
- (c) Could the Minister advise how trainees are selected for admission on the programme?

The Minister of Science, Technology and Tertiary Education (Sen. The Hon. Danny Montano): During the period July—December 2002, 2,418 trainees were placed in the On-the-Job Training Programme. The breakdown of the trainees by sections is as follows: the public sector, 1,979 and the private sector, 439.

With respect to (b), trainees placed within government ministries and agencies were paid stipends as follows: secondary school graduates, \$1,250 per month; technician certificates/associate degrees, \$1,800 per month and university graduates, \$3,000 per month. The stipends paid by the private sector was left to their discretion, with a stipulation that no trainee is to be paid less than the minimum wage. The private sector is encouraged to pay stipends in accordance with the qualifications of the trainees along the lines set out by the ministry. In general, the private sector trainees are paid the same or higher than the public sector trainees. Private sector companies and state enterprises are reimbursed 50 per cent of the minimum wage. Up until April 01, 2003 that was \$3.50 an hour. From April 01, 2003, onwards, that was \$4.00 an hour. Provision has been made to pay the arrears between the \$3.50 and \$4.00 from January 01 to March 31, 2003.

With respect to (c), trainee application forms are registered on a database. Trainees are selected by matching the skill of the trainees with the jobs available. The selection process also takes into account the date of the application, the location of the residence of the trainee and the location of the relevant jobs available.

**National Housing Authority (NHA)
(Application Forms)**

128. Dr. Hamza Rafeeq (*Caroni Central*) asked the hon. Minister of Housing:

- (a) Could the Minister state whether there is a current shortage of application forms for National Housing Authority (NHA) houses?

- (b) If so, could the Minister indicate what steps are being taken to ensure that application forms for National Housing Authority (NHA) houses are made available to all citizens of Trinidad and Tobago who wish to apply for National Housing Authority (NHA) houses?

The Minister of Housing (Sen. The Hon. Martin Joseph): Mr. Speaker, there is no shortage of application forms for National Housing Authority (NHA) houses. The Member for Caroni Central may wish to note that during the period January—May 2003, 17,642 forms were distributed. Application forms have also been lodged at all regional corporations and NHA sub-offices at Maloney, Couva, San Fernando, Cocorite, Duncan Street, Oxford Street and Morvant, for members of the public who wish to apply for NHA housing.

In light of the response to part (a), a response to part (b) is not applicable.

Mr. S. Panday: Could the Minister kindly say why forms were not placed at the Princes Town Regional Corporation?

Sen. The Hon. M. Joseph: I am not aware that forms were not placed at the Princes Town Regional Corporation.

Dr. Rafeeq: I do not know if the Minister would be able to tell us, whether for the last six months there was a shortage of forms? The Minister said from January to now there has not been a shortage, what about prior to that?

Sen. The Hon. M. Joseph: I am not in a position to indicate. [*Crosstalk*]

Mr. Speaker: Member for Couva South, please, we have a supplemental question.

Dr. Rafeeq: I just wanted to find out from the hon. Minister whether, in the selection criteria, that would include the date of application? What has happened is that there was a shortage of forms in some of the Central areas and they got forms late. If one of the criteria is the date of application, then their applications would have been late. I want to know whether that is one of the criteria for selection?

Sen. The Hon. M. Joseph: The question about criteria, with respect to the allocation of housing, would be a decision taken by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago and all variables would be taken into consideration in determining the question of the allocation procedure.

Dr. Rafeeq: Including the date of the application?

Sen. The Hon. M. Joseph: Including the date of the application. [*Crosstalk*]

NO CONFIDENCE MOTION

(MINISTER OF NATIONAL SECURITY AND REHABILITATION)

Miss Gillian Lucky (*Pointe-a-Pierre*): Mr. Speaker, I beg to move:

Whereas section 4(a) of the Constitution of Trinidad and Tobago preserves the right of the individual to life, liberty, security of the person and enjoyment of property and the right not to be deprived thereof except by due process of law;

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And whereas the Minister of National Security is specifically responsible for formulating policy to deal with the issue of national security and is a key member of the National Security Council of Trinidad and Tobago which is chaired by the Prime Minister;

And whereas based on statistical data it is evident that incidents of crime, especially and including the offences of kidnapping and false imprisonment are rising to alarming proportions evidencing the dismal failure of the Government to formulate effective policies to combat crime;

And whereas the citizens of Trinidad and Tobago are victims of the escalating criminal activity and cannot depend on the Government to provide adequate national security;

Be it resolved that the present Minister of National Security be removed with immediate effect from his office;

And be it further resolved that a committee be formed comprising persons selected by the Government in consultation with the Opposition to formulate an action plan to fight escalating crime in Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Speaker, the situation with respect to escalating crime is worsening with each passing day. Because of this PNM Government, and its inability to deal effectively and efficiently with the situation, our citizens are now at the mercy of criminals; to the extent that we now have to beg the criminals to stop their gruesome acts.

Mr. Speaker, when the fight against crime reaches to the stage that the only approach that can be taken by the Government is compromise and begging for mercy, we know that we are losing the fight against crime. We are losing that fight very badly. Very soon, the criminals would be running the show and Trinidad and Tobago is going to be worse than Gotham City.

The situation is so horrible that today, more than ever, citizens wish that super heroes such as Superman, Spiderman, Batman and Robin and Wonder Woman were not fictional characters, but real life heroes upon whom we could depend here in Trinidad and Tobago, to restore some kind of order. In this Government however, we have no super heroes, what we have are "super zeros": persons who are ill-equipped to handle the job. [*Desk thumping*] Yet, amazingly the group of "super zeroes" continues to increase. While our country faces its demise at the hands of the criminals, a bunch of ballistic bandits, bent on wreaking havoc in our society, this PNM Government continues to keep assuring the nation that we

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should be calm, do not worry, no need to panic: everything is under control. But what we can clearly state is that when it comes to crime; when this Government says it is in control, what it really means is that things have gone out of control. In the same way the hon. Prime Minister, the Member for San Fernando East—it has been reported as recently as today—said, with respect to the BWIA situation, enough is enough, the Opposition says today that with respect to the PNM Government’s blatant inability to deal with fighting crime, enough is enough. [Desk thumping]

Mr. Speaker, this afternoon is not an afternoon to exaggerate or exacerbate the crime situation that we face here in Trinidad and Tobago. In fact, we have to look at the facts coldly, clinically and analytically. This afternoon is not a matter for political rhetoric: it is an issue that confronts all of us and an issue that we must deal with in a very bold fashion. Just today, in an article that is reported in the *Trinidad Express*, at page 5 the headline reads:

“Gonzales urges region’s Govts to reject criminals”

In a story by Curtis Williams, it states:

“St. Vincent and the Grenadines Prime Minister Dr. Ralph Gonzales yesterday warned that Caribbean governments needed to be tough on criminals and not negotiate with them.”

Immediately what comes to mind is that we should not be meeting with gang leaders. We should not be giving people who have committed serious criminal acts, priority bus route passes. We should not be meeting with gang leaders. In the fight against crime, there must be no compromise; zero tolerance to criminals. [Desk thumping] Here we have Dr. Ralph Gonzales, I think he is a friend of the Member for San Fernando East—perhaps not as good a friend as Mr. Jones—saying openly, very openly, that: “Listen, in the fight against crime, there must be no compromise.” In fact Dr. Gonzales said:

“...crime was a major issue facing the region and that aggressive measures needed to be taken against criminals.”

This is what Dr. Gonzales said and I am quoting.

“I have told police officers in St. Vincent and the Grenadines that when you meet these criminals, you don’t have to read them the beatitudes because these are the same people who will take your life. That is our position. You cannot talk hardcore criminals out of committing crimes but you can talk people away from becoming criminals.”

This was in response to a question from the DOMA President about a seeming relationship between the Manning administration and criminal elements. Our friend in St. Vincent and the Grenadines is saying: in the fight against crime, you cannot be meeting with gang leaders; whether you call them gang leaders or community leaders. You cannot be seen to be embracing them. You cannot be perceived to be afraid of them. You cannot be seen in any way to be procuring, inciting or conspiring with them. The unfortunate thing is, those atrocities and that manner of dealing with crime is the manner that has been adopted by the Government of Trinidad and Tobago and it is the wrong approach.

I still live in hope, Mr. Speaker, that in the same way the hon. Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East, sometime last year, recognized that there was a certain land deal that he had to back out of because he said the voice of the people did not favour that move—there was a picture, I remember it in the newspaper well, with senior Cabinet Ministers who were obviously looking very embarrassed at what had taken place. What the Prime Minister gave with the right hand had to be taken away with the left. Mr. Speaker, I too am hoping that after debate on this Motion, good sense will prevail and the hon. Prime Minister will recognize that the voice of the people, the people that matter, is saying remove the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation, he is not functioning. [*Desk thumping*] Give this country a Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation who can do the job.

There is another alternative, look how well it worked out for the Member for Diego Martin Central when the hon. Prime Minister, very generously, gave him assistance in the competent person of Sen. The Hon. Christine Sahadeo. Look how well the hon. Member took it. On that very day in Parliament, some of us found him a little edgy. We found that he was not his normal jovial self. When I, in one of my unusual asides, said to the Member for Diego Martin Central: “Like yuh upset?” He said: “Upset? I am not upset, I welcome the help.” In the same way that it was found that the hon. Member for Diego Martin Central needed a little help and the help he needed was obviously not as much help as the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation needs, it is clear if we are using that equal—a word that does not seem to mean the same today, as it did many years ago—if the Government wants to give equal treatment and ensure that it is not guilty of double standards, then give the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation the help he needs. Either make him shape up or ship out. My understanding is that there are ships that are willing to take him; some that even come to his own Pier I. Mr. Speaker, I am not in a very jokey mood this afternoon because it is very serious: the issue of crime. When in today's newspaper, the *Newsday* on page 4, we read a headline that says:

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“Daughter released... but parents’ lives at risk”

This story is by Wendy Campbell. Mr. Speaker, I want to make sure that I always give the kudos and recognition to those who are writing these stories, because the media continues to play a very critical role in this fight against crime and we need them more than we ever needed them before. It is very worrying, because here we have a situation in which the whole country prayed for the release of this innocent girl, Kerri Greaves, and we thank God that she has been returned safely—we are told—but as she is released, the parents’ lives are now at risk. There is no letting up, there is still trauma.

Right under that story we see ten guns stolen from a security firm. This is a story by Nalinee Seelal, in which it is indicated that there was a break-in and at least 10 guns and ammunition were stolen. It is alleged that there is a gun-rental ring in Trinidad and Tobago. In this gun-rental ring, criminals who just want to go and do specific acts or have named targets, rent a gun—just in the same way you can rent a car—use the gun and the next day hand it back. That is what has now begun to take place. That is a lucrative business in Trinidad and Tobago. This kind of criminal activity that we are witnessing in our beloved country today has to be and can only be the result of a government that cannot handle the fight against crime. [*Desk thumping*]

I am not saying that the Government must come forward and admit that they have failed. There are very diplomatic ways that you can deal with a situation without admitting failure; not in the way the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation deals with it by saying he is no failure. He is always assessing himself: he is no failure. What the Government of the day is being encouraged by this Motion to do is actually consistent with what this Government has always said it is willing to do; that is, to co-operate with the Opposition in the fight against crime. That is why one of the important aspects of this Motion is asking the Government, in consultation with the Opposition, to find persons to comprise this team that will really give us a crime plan of which we can be proud; not Minister Chin Lee’s crime plan A, B, C or Operation Anaconda. I will not call it Operation Baghdad because I understand that was a term that was actually ascribed rather than used. All the crime plans and anacondas have failed, and they have failed miserably. We have now reached the stage—still continuing with that *Newsday*, page 4, where we have a Minister, Sen. The Hon. Hazel Manning, who visits the family of the kidnapped boy saying:

“Leave the children alone.”

That is the headline.

“‘Leave the children alone’ she pleads.”

Education Minister Hazel Manning yesterday visited the family of six-year-old kidnap victim, Mark Prescott, and called on persons behind the spate of kidnappings in the country to stop targeting children.”

With the greatest respect, I commend the Minister for visiting the family. I commend all those who have visited the family and all of us who are praying for the safe return of this six-year-old boy, but at the end of the day, look at what we have reached to in Trinidad and Tobago. We now have to pick and choose what we are telling criminals as we beg them. The message to the criminals is to leave the children alone. Are we, therefore, implying that it is okay to kidnap other persons? I would equally say that kidnappers ought not to kidnap women. When you kidnap a woman there are so many other criminal offences that usually are done that sometimes the female victims are too scared or ashamed to report. I am sure every Member here knows the seriousness of what I am saying. When innocent women are kidnapped and other offences take place such as rape, or serious indecency, for which they may be embarrassed, and they decide that they will not say that evidence or just never reveal it happened, you might find even in the evidence they give, there is a certain sort of lacuna, or something does not sound right because they are trying to cover it up. That is a reality. I am glad for the silence in the Chamber because this is what is happening in Trinidad and Tobago.

The message we should be sending is not leave the children alone, it is leave the people of Trinidad and Tobago alone. Leave us alone! [*Desk thumping*] You have no right to kidnap us. Maybe the interpretation by the Minister is, Mark Prescott is six years old so it is “kid” napping because he is a kid. I suppose when you take women, it might be “women-napping”, when you take pets it might be “petnapping”, I have no idea. Kidnapping affects everybody. When we are sending the message to the criminals, we cannot be compromising in the words that we use. We cannot be generous in the words that we use. We should be sending the message: “Release all kidnapped victims now and when you plead guilty in the courtrooms, we will see, if at all, whether your sentence will be mitigated.” That is how far-reaching our message should be.

Mr. Hinds: Yes, Sir.

Miss. G. Lucky: How do we look on the international front? I am sure that the Member who shouted that recognizes that in law, man includes woman, so he is very right. [*Desk thumping*] Even if he did not know, I have just educated him.

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I have always said that he does not know the law as he ought to. The Speaker is so engrossed in what I am saying he probably did not hear it.

How are we looking on the international front? I saw a documentary that was produced in Canada which really worried me. In that documentary—for what anybody may say, there would be those who argue that they produced this documentary for dramatic effect—there was a phrase that was used at the end of that documentary: a phrase that, every time I say it or think of it, not only reflects what is happening in my beloved country, but it also reflects what the international community thinks about Trinidad and Tobago—the phrase is: “The sun never sets on an unsolved murder except, maybe, in Trinidad and Tobago.” That phrase says it all. What it means is, that whereas everybody would expect in a country where there are murders and kidnappings there will be that level of commitment and passion to solve, in Trinidad and Tobago, the sun sets on unsolved murders. That is the situation in Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Speaker, before coming to Parliament this afternoon, I took the opportunity to look at the country advice that is presently on the Internet for the foreign and Commonwealth office. For May 23, 2003, we are still looking as badly as we did before. That is why we in the Opposition had made the point that if the Government really wants to improve the international image of Trinidad and Tobago, do not come boasting about how economic the convoy of persons sent to the United Kingdom and Washington was, we did not waste money and a lot was done. That is not how we improve the image. What we needed at that point in time, and we still need, is a government by its actions that can show how committed it is to the fight against crime.

I want to tell the hon. Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East—through you, Mr. Speaker, I say this with the greatest of respect to him—if he really wants to score points, if he really wants to show to the regional and international communities how serious he is about fighting crime, then do that which the Westminster system allows him to do; based on its ethics, conventions and traditions: when a minister is not working, or for some reason cannot produce the expected level and he is not doing the honourable thing by resigning, then help him to resign; remove Minister Chin Lee forthwith. Give him another portfolio. Do not embarrass him if you do not want to embarrass him.

Mr. Speaker, let me make it very clear, I am not here this afternoon to bash Minister Chin Lee. When I heard that he was going to be the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation, as a young person—I look around and I could see that there are not too many of us who can go into that category—I felt happy that

the PNM and the Government of the day was giving him a chance and the Prime Minister was saying okay young person let us see what you can do. When I realized that this young person was not prepared to listen, was arrogant, had no kind of policy, had no 2020 vision, then I realized that to whom much is given, much is expected and unfortunately, this young person was just not living up to the grade.

Again, Mr. Speaker, I reiterate, there is a way in which this whole thing can be dealt with. In the same way that certain ministries that might have been said to be going into the shadow of the valley of death or the valley of debt, and they have gotten that assistance, let us help that Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation. He talks about giving the police the resources that they need, we are talking about giving that Minister the resources that he needs: either a new minister to assist him, or let him understand that politics is not for him. Let him go home where he can continue to sleep well.

This brings me to the next point: the ability of the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation to say in an interview, which I am sure he knew was going to get widespread publicity and would be read by members of the public—The Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation sometimes—with the greatest of respect to him—you cannot find him. He turns up at funerals and wakes, but somehow you cannot find him as often as you would like. When it was advertised that he would be in *The Sunday Guardian* interview of April 13, 2003—an interview done by BC Pires—many persons, including myself, decided to read what the Minister had to say. What I want to put formally on the record is what this Minister had to say on April 13, 2003. The interview must have been done sometime very near to that date or before that date. Before I read an excerpt of what he said, I want to give an idea of the statistics of crimes that were occurring in Trinidad and Tobago under his stewardship, just before the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation gave this interview. I am quoting from a document called *The Provisional Figures, Monthly Serious Crimes 2003*, under the rubric

“Total serious crimes reported January 01—31, 2003

January—

total number of murders: 17 reported, 6 undetected;
woundings and shootings: 56 reported, 26 undetected;
rapes/incest/sexual offences: 51 reported, 33 detected;
kidnappings: 29 reported, 12 detected;

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robberies:”

These figures were alarming—

“296 reported, 32 detected.”

Those were just some of the crime statistics for January. In February the figures seem to have gotten worse.

“February—

total number of murders: 15 reported, 4 detected;

total number of woundings and shootings: 56 reported, 16 detected;

kidnappings: 15 reported, 7 detected;”

robberies; again an alarming disparity—

“363 reported, 56 detected;

March—

total number of murders: 25 reported, 8 detected;

woundings and shootings: 67 reported, 26 detected;

kidnappings: 21 reported, 13 detected;”

Again, the alarming rate of detection or lack thereof—

“326 robberies reported, 52 detected;”

For the month of April, the month in which this interview was given by the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation—

“Total number of murders reported: 13, 3 detected;

woundings and shootings: 66 reported, 17 detected;

rapes/incest/sexual offences: 43 reported, 26 detected;

kidnappings: 17 reported, 6 detected;

robberies: 346 reported, 42 detected.”

If we would think of what was happening in the country from January 2003 to mid-April 2003, we would all remember that the country was coming to grips with the fact that the media was saying Trinidad and Tobago had experienced its bloodiest year in the year 2002. We were just coming to terms with the fact that this situation is bad. We were reading about kidnapers and persons who were

falsely imprisoning others, making ransom demands and threats with those ransoms. We remember the Commissioner of Police literally saying do not pay the ransoms, whereas some family members were saying we might have no alternative but to pay. The whole country began realising that the crime situation is very bad and we cannot remain calm, we have to panic. The headline in the interview with the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation, Howard Chin Lee is:

“I sleep very well”

This was in *The Sunday Guardian*; a picture with him not looking very stressed out. On page 8 of *The Sunday Guardian* of April 13, 2003:

“I sleep very well”

Mr. Speaker, how could a responsible Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation sleep while the rest of the nation remains awake, wondering and worrying whether we would be the next victim of a kidnapping, a murder, a rape, a serious indecency or a robbery? The Minister is sleeping very well. This is the question he was asked:

“Is it true you would like to resign but the Prime Minister won’t allow you to, so you’re now arranging for your own kidnap?”

(laughs for five seconds) That’s a very interesting concept. But I don’t think anybody would pay my ransom.

You have the least desirable job in Cabinet. If you could go back in time to when you were offered this ministry, would you take it?”

A chance for the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation to give some kind of answer that could reassure the public and make us feel he understands the seriousness of the ministry he agreed to take. I would like to think nobody held a gun at this head.

[*Chamber lights dimmed*]

Mr. Speaker, it is normally said that when the truth is being spoken even the lights dim. [*Desk thumping*] This was the response—I hope that the lights are not going dim with the hope that I would not read the embarrassing response because this is it:

“I console myself by telling myself I do the best I can on a day-to-day basis.

Quite frankly, I sleep very well at night.”

I could just imagine, Mr. Speaker, before the Minister goes to sleep he tells himself: “Yuh doing ah nice job, yuh doing ah nice job.” He goes to sleep and

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wakes up the next day, blissfully unaware of what is happening in the country, it would seem.

When a minister of national security behaves in this kind of manner and he has been given so many opportunities: endorsements by the Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East on numerous occasions saying: “I will not fire this Minister. I believe in this Minister, he is doing a very good job.” In spite of all this support that Minister Chin Lee gets, he is still a dismal failure. I am not going to be diplomatic in that statement. I am taking the advice of the Prime Minister in our neighbouring region and those who know how to fight crime by saying; in the fight against crime, you have to be frank and forthright and you have to give the job to people who can get the job done. If somebody prefers to sleep, well let them sleep, but not at the expense of the safety of this nation.

Mr. Speaker, is it that the situation with respect to citizens in Trinidad and Tobago is being exaggerated? Is it that it really is not as bad as it looks and it is really much better, but we are all just creating panic for no reason? In the *Newsday* of Sunday, May 18, page 6, the headline is:

“With increased kidnappings, parents face

Daily nightmare of sending your children to school.”

Parents in Trinidad and Tobago are now saying that sending their children to school; something which I think we all recognize—whether we are on that or this side—that education is fundamental to the development of a nation. It is critical that when young people go to school, or people go to any institute where they can be educated, that they feel that they are comfortable and that they are in a safe environment. We have reached the stage now in Trinidad and Tobago, where parents are afraid of sending their children to school.

Then the business community, in *The Sunday Guardian* of April 06, 2003:

“Kidnappings drive businessmen to desperate measures”

The business community is being driven to desperate measures. What they are recognizing is that the situation is out of control. Some of these businessmen are so desperate that, without recognizing the legal flaws in legislation, they are saying pass it, support it. That is how desperate they have become. They are not reading legislation anymore and understanding the implications; they are just saying support it, because we need something done, not recognizing that if support is given to fatally flawed legislation, you would be creating more mischief than solving problems. The business community is worried.

We have another story in the *Guardian* of Wednesday, April 30; a story written by Geisha Kowlessar which states:

“Odds against committed cops as...

Criminals lured by blossoming trade”

Even the committed police officers in Trinidad and Tobago are saying: “Listen, we are committed, but you know what? The odds are stacked against us and even though we are committed, we are recognizing that there is a blossoming trade and we feel as though we are impotent and we cannot handle it.” I am quoting:

“Describing this particular criminal activity...”

that is kidnapping in relation to children,

“as a cash cow, police said parents will always be willing to pay a ransom for the safe return of their children.”

The police are recognizing now that in the fight against crime, how do you really tell parents when their little children, their vulnerable, innocent children are kidnapped, do not pay the ransom when they are being threatened by the kidnappers? They are being told: “If you do not pay it, we will destroy, kill or maim your child.” Now parents are in a quandary. Slowly, but surely, the criminal activities in Trinidad and Tobago are escalating and the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and the National Security Council do not seem to be able to control it and it has filtered to everyone in the society. What is happening now is that those committing crimes are realising that they are on centre stage.

What is the public saying now? Are we exaggerating the public’s reaction? According to page 9 of *The Sunday Guardian* of May 04, 2003, the headline:

“Bring back hangings”

The population and the public is now saying: “Listen, we want to get into this whole action to fight crime. We realize the situation is desperate. We are saying, bring back the hangings, maybe that will solve the problem.” What is clear is that in one of the questions that was asked:

“Are you satisfied with the way Government is dealing with the present state of crime?”

Very satisfied = 1%

Satisfied = 23%

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Unsatisfied	=	46%
Very Unsatisfied	=	27%
Don't Know	=	3%”

Let me be fair and read all the answers to that particular question. The question was:

“Are you satisfied with the way the Government is dealing with the present state of crime?”

This is what those involved in the poll said:

“Very satisfied	=	1%
Satisfied	=	23%
Unsatisfied	=	46%
Very Unsatisfied	=	27%
Don't Know	=	3%”

Mr. Speaker, when you add the response to unsatisfied and very unsatisfied, the number that one gets is 73 per cent. Seventy-three per cent in this poll say this Government is failing, this Government cannot handle crime and we are not happy with the way they are handling crime. In the same way that the hon. Member for San Fernando East listened to the voice of the people when they said: “Do not give the land, take it back.” We on this side are respectfully asking the hon. Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East to once again listen to the voice of the people: the voice that says: Get rid of the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and form a team that will be able to implement a crime plan that will work and protect all citizens of Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Speaker, there are many who claim to be experts in fighting crime. I am not here to say in any way whether they are right or wrong with their approach and their analysis, but what I can say is that I have had nine years as a prosecutor. Many people may not appreciate that when you are a prosecutor with the Office of the Director of Public Prosecutions (DPP), you interact with all levels of persons dealing with the fight against crime. You deal with witnesses upon whom you depend to give the evidence and testify so that you can prove your case beyond reasonable doubt. You deal with these witnesses; many of whom are victims who say: “I am not prepared to give the evidence. I am afraid. What will happen to my parents or family if I give the evidence? I do not feel I could go through the

trauma again.” [Interruption] We are coming to that threat too. I understand the Member for Caroni East is getting a lot of pro bono legal advice on the matter.

Mr. Speaker, you deal with victims and you sometimes find yourself in a position where you are actually trying to be a psychiatrist and to be supportive, so you deal with victims of crime. You deal with the police officers, again, upon whom you depend to have conducted their investigation in a manner in which it can stand rigorous cross-examination. Sometimes when you find yourself in a position, as I did, saying to police officers: “Why did I not get this particular piece of evidence, or why is it that the exhibit is taking so long to come from the Forensic Science Centre?” They would raise their hands and say: “What do you want us to do? We do not have the necessary resources.”

You deal with the magistrates’ court, the High Court and the Court of Appeal and the lack of resources in those places: where justice is supposed to be administered. In my days I knew what it was like to be a state counsel: doing a matter 9.00 o’clock in Sangre Grande—in those days—I understand even now—state counsel did not get priority bus route passes, the way other persons like Yasin Abu Bakr can get it,—to do another matter by 11.00 o’clock in Arima, to hit Tunapuna by 2.00 o’clock and if you really have to stretch it, sometimes you are doing a matter in Port of Spain because the magistrate indicated: “Listen, I will sit late.” That is the kind of rigorous training that I got as a state prosecutor.

So, now it is for me to assess the performance of the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and I can stand proud and say he is not a failure; he is a dismal failure. [Desk thumping] More than that, it is my job to assess performances of people in a certain regard, in that I have been a lecturer at the University of the West Indies, lecturing in commercial and business law. I could tell you that my course was apparently so popular that at one time the registration was 324 students. [Desk thumping] They had to open two lecture theatres. [Desk thumping] I know what it is to sit around Christmas time reading through exam papers, assessing people. When you are marking examination scripts, students do not get a chance to write at the end of the script: “Dear Miss Lucky, I feel I did this exam very well, please make sure that you grade me accordingly; that is high.” They depend on an expert to assess them. When the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation says that he is doing a good job, he is sleeping well, he is no failure, anaconda is great and we had a crime-free Carnival, all he is doing is looking at himself in a mirror and he is fooling himself. What the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation should do is look at the statistics: some of which I have just read.

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I want to explain how the Westminster system ought to really operate. Many years ago—it would have been in the 1980s—I am sure many of us in this honourable Chamber would remember—there was the Falklands War. In the end there were Argentina and England and the English were successful and they were able to deal with the Falklands crisis, as it was called. What was amazing was that the Minister of National Security in England, at the time—although he could not have known that there was going to be a war and a crisis, but because he should have known, or ought to have known, or availed himself of information that would have given him a clue that it was going to happen—did not have to be asked to resign. He did that which was honourable and he tendered his resignation. He resigned because he recognized that what had happened was a direct indictment on his own performance or lack of performance. All I am asking this afternoon is for every Member on the PNM side and our side to really ask the question: “Are we pleased, or am I pleased with the performance of the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation?” There can be only one accurate answer, which is a resounding no! Anything else is a lie.

Do you know what has happened now that is even worse? We have the glorification of crime. Crime is now the “in thing”. In Trinidad and Tobago, they are not saying be like Ato Boldon, Brian Lara or anybody who might have been living in Laventille or anywhere else in the country and has made us proud, be like Sir Vidya Naipaul or whoever you want, who has done well in something that has positively developed Trinidad and Tobago, somebody who has really carried the banner of Trinidad and Tobago as a true cheerleader. Instead of being like those heroes, little children and young impressionable minds of teenagers are being told: “Do not be like a hero, be like a zero. Be like a criminal. Do not be like Mike, as in Michael Jordan, be like Mark, as in Mark Guerra.”

Mark Guerra has gotten something that many of us in this country will never get, that is a whole wall painted with his face. I was amazed when I read an article in which a young person who was endorsing that portrait said: Mark Guerra, with all the criminal activities that Mark Guerra was allegedly involved in—I still want to be as guarded as I can, even I know that the law protects anybody who makes aspersions or allegations against a dead person. I want to remind you that the Member of Parliament for Caroni East is very much alive, therefore, those kinds of allegations and threats should not be made. With respect to Mark Guerra, this young person said Mark Guerra was like the Prophet Moses. In the same way that Moses led his people to the Promised Land, this young person was saying Mark Guerra is not merely his hero; he is like the Prophet Moses. Imagine this is what a young person believes to be true. Certainly, the Member for San Fernando East

must be worried when young people are beginning to think like this. Certainly, the Member for San Fernando East must be very worried when he recognizes his mistake in meeting gang leaders and community leaders. There is no need for him to nod and admit. In his heart and his conscience he knows what I am saying is right. Certainly, it must worry the Prime Minister that young people in this country now feel that crime pays, and more crime pays more.

I am sure the hon. Member for San Fernando East is asking himself; with such a beautiful building as the National Library; a place where people can go and seek to educate themselves, why is it, recently, we are reading that there will now have to be increased security because of the vandalism, the acts—as they were described—of terrorism inside? Young children are showing their deviant behaviour right in the midst of Port of Spain, so much so, that when a foreign delegation was taken to the National Library, they stood in their shoes and wondered whether this is really a place of learning. Mr. Speaker, the National Library, unfortunately, is slowly but surely becoming a place where you can go to learn about criminal activities. That is why, unless and until the PNM and the Government of the day recognize that they have actually polluted and contaminated the minds of young people in Trinidad and Tobago and they do something about it, more than hyping up HYPE and putting more money in CEPEP and promising a University of Trinidad and Tobago in Wallerfield—we already have one in the east and we are getting one further east now—that shows fairness and vision. Until the Government of the day recognizes that young people who are the future of our nation, have decided to go into this glorious life of crime and they do something about it, then we will all pay the very high price.

In light of all of this, what becomes even more amazing is that the hon. Member for San Fernando East is reported on page 17 of the Saturday *Newsday* of April 12, 2003, under a headline that says:

“Manning: It’s a paradox—Leaving TT to settle in NY

Prime Minister Patrick Manning cannot understand how people could say they are leaving Trinidad and Tobago because they don’t feel safe and they are going to New York to settle.”

2.30 p.m.

Mr. Speaker, obviously, the logic of the hon. Member for San Fernando East was that New York has a very bad situation when it comes to crime and Trinidad and Tobago also has a bad situation when it comes to crime; so why people would want to move from one place of crime to another? Mr. Speaker, the answer is very

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simple, it is because crime in Trinidad and Tobago has reached to such alarming proportions that people are willing—even if it means “jumping from the frying pan into the fire”—to leave their homes that they love, and that is also very worrying.

Mr. Speaker, I remember when I was a 7-year-old—and that was in the days when parents did not have to worry about sending their children to school. In fact, parents were very excited to get their children to this place of learning, and in those days, children ran all over the school yard because it was safe to do so. I remember when I attended St. Gabriel’s RC Primary School, which is actually the sister school where Mark Prescott was kidnapped—that is San Fernando Boys’ RC—and I looked forward to going to school and never had to worry about being kidnapped. I remember reading stories and learning poems from the *West Indian Reader*, and these stories and poems had a very local and Caribbean touch. One of the poems I had to learn was a poem by Allister Mc Millan, which says:

“Those who eat the cascadura will
the native legend says
wheresoever they may wander
End in Trinidad their days
And this lovely fragrant island
with its forest so sublime
well might be the smiling Eden
Pictured in the book divine.”

When I learned that poem, I said to myself, “I could really see how the poet felt about Trinidad and Tobago, ‘with its forest so sublime,’ because in those days, there was no Community-Based Environmental Protection and Enhancement Programme (CEPEP) moving away everything, and there were no bush fires. One could have seen the green trees on the hillside, and I recognized that this is my country. “Trinidad is my land of which I am proud and glad.” So, in my days, when you learn poems such as this one, it meant something to you. Today, when a young person learns that poem—first of all, I am sure that the young person is going to ask: Which “forest so sublime” and what “smiling Eden”?

Today, in Trinidad, we are not seeing people with smiling faces, because obviously with the escalating crime situation, and the Government’s inability to deal with crime, the Government is not taking very positive measures and harsh

steps that they should take but, instead, the Government is flirting, seducing, harbouring and embracing the criminals. A young person today will certainly ask himself, “Really, what is this paradise that is referred to as Trinidad?” The good news is that we could have the return of our paradise, but the only way we could have the return of that paradise—before the UNC becomes the government of Trinidad and Tobago again—is if the Government listens and implements the suggestions being made by those of us on this sides.

Mr. Speaker, and what is happening? In *The Trinidad Guardian* newspaper dated February 03, 2003 there was a headline: “Chin Lee on crime: More fear than reality” and the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation says:

“...there is a disparity between the fear of crime and the reality of crime.”

In other words, if you find yourself being afraid of crime, you have no reason to be afraid, because that fear is not a reality. That is the kind of twisted logic that is being used. So, instead of fighting crime, reducing the spate of kidnappings, false imprisonment and serious criminal activities, what the PNM Government is seeking to do is to brainwash the nation.

Mr. Speaker, we want to make it very clear that the people of Trinidad and Tobago are not fools; the people of Trinidad and Tobago could see, hear, read and they understand that they are victims. It is clear that the Government has not been able to put a handle on crime, and the Government has not been able to send a powerful message to the criminals that they would not tolerate their activities.

Sometimes it is said that you could overdo a particular argument when it is clear that everyone knows what you are proposing, and it is sometimes said that you are pushing on an open door. Mr. Speaker, on the front page of the *TNT Mirror* dated Friday, April 18, 2003 there was a story headlined:

“National Security shocker rocks Carenage Heroin cruises into Chin Lee’s Pier 1 Deadly Panyol connection exposed.”

When I read that story, I said to myself, even if there was a perception that there was some kind of association or knowledge or whatever—be as diplomatic as you want; be as accurate as you want—the reality is that in any other country where there is an operating democracy—and not a galloping dictatorship—such a minister would not be asked to resign, but the minister would do the honourable thing and tender his resignation forthwith. The Minister should then say to the Prime Minister of the day, “Here is my resignation, but I would ask that when my name is cleared, perhaps you might reconsider me, or I would reconsider my position.” But we do not have that here in Trinidad and Tobago.

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In Trinidad and Tobago—according to the hon. Member for San Fernando East—as long as you have common sense and a level head that entitles you to be a Member of his Cabinet, and because so many people have common sense and a level head, I understand why the Member’s Cabinet is just expanding to alarming proportions, because everyone is now coming and saying, “We, too, have common sense and a level head.”

Mr. Speaker, when the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation gives assurances, as was reported in the *Sunday Newsday* newspaper dated Sunday, May 18, 2003, in a story by Nalinee Seelal, the Minister promised the young victim, Keiwon Sullivan, that the police would arrest the person who did that to him. With the greatest of respect, I do not think that anyone who is getting an assurance from this non-performing Minister would feel any sense of comfort. A Minister who is not performing and saying that he would do all within his powers to ensure safety—when he cannot even ensure the safety of citizens who are literally taking their own precautions to be saved—is not going to give anyone any word of security, or any word of comfort.

What is amazing is that even when institutions—for example, the Hindu Credit Union came up with a 10-point plan and the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation was once again able to say that their plan was not workable. So the Minister’s plans are not working; the Minister has reached to crime plan “COD”; the Minister’s anaconda has gone to rest; there is an operation in Laventille and the Minister is talking about curfews and being in hot spots; but at the end of the day, the Minister was able to say to everyone who gave suggestions that their plans are not workable. That is why it becomes imperative—and it is part of the Motion—that what is needed is that a team must be formed by the Government, in consultation with the Opposition, to ensure that persons with the necessary expertise could, in fact, come up with a crime plan that would restore this nation.

Mr. Speaker, we have to be so careful in this day and age about what we say; the words that fall from our lips—

Mr. Manning: It should be applied across the board.

Miss G. Lucky: I agree with the Member for San Fernando East that it should be applied across the board—even though in a short while I would be explaining to the hon. Member, the unfortunate utterance that he made. We all have to be careful, because even though we may not mean a particular thing, the crime situation has become so bad now that young people, and people who have

criminal tendencies would readily misinterpret what is being said, and they may find themselves actually endorsing the problem of wanting to break the law, or wanting to do things to innocent people, and they may wrongly feel that they are getting their actions condoned by those who make these statements. Mr. Speaker, what do I mean by this? Well, allow me to refer to a story by Curtis Rampersad in the *Express* newspaper dated Monday, May 19, 2003, headlined: “Manning promises licks for UNC in Caroni” and it says:

“The Patrick Manning administration is threatening to share licks in the upcoming local government election with the PNM planting its feet in the Opposition territory of Caroni.

“That is the next battle. That is when we are going to be sharing licks left, right and centre. They (the Opposition) trembling. They know it coming,” Manning told several thousand party supporters yesterday.”

Mr. Speaker, bearing in mind that we live in very violent times, and that there are persons who feel that they could beat up others, commit acts of thuggery and barbarism and get away with it, when the Prime Minister of a country stands up in this kind of environment—where lawlessness is the order of the day—and says, “They are trembling because we are going to be sharing licks, they would get licks; left, right and centre”, you must understand that people hearing this may feel that what they are being told is that they could go into Central, Ortoire/Mayaro, Tunapuna, Barataria/San Juan and San Fernando West and just share licks, and they would take what might be meant as a “metaphor” and make it a reality. That is why we have to be very careful about what we say in this kind of environment.

Mr. Speaker, in the same way, in today’s *Trinidad Guardian* newspaper dated May 23, 2003, there is a story by Carol Matroo headlined: “No Laquis is corrupt says Dr. Joe” and in the final paragraph it says:

“Laquis also warned that if Singh continued to malign him, he would feel his (Laquis) wrath.

‘I shall ban him from entering any part of the East/West Corridor or speaking on any political platform. If he feels this is a joke, let him try.’ Laquis said.”

Mr. Speaker, I just want to repeat the last part of that quotation:

“‘I shall ban him...’”

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That is I shall ban Ganga Singh:

“from entering any part of the East-West Corridor or speaking on any political platform.”

So, it is not just a political platform in the East-West Corridor, but any political platform. Even if the Member for Caroni East found himself on a PNM platform he would be banned, or any regional political platform the Member would be banned, and more than that it goes on to say:

“If he feels this is a joke...”

So, even if the Member of Parliament for Caroni East feels, “Well, listen, Dr. Joe Laquis does not mean what he is saying, I am not worried.” The Member is also being warned and threatened:

“If he feels this is a joke, let him try.”

And when the very vocal Member for Couva South said words to the effect—and I am sure the Member could correct me if I am wrong—that he could not guarantee the safety of the Member for Port of Spain North/St. Ann’s West in Central, the Member was chastised and abused, and people said that the hon. Member for Couva South should have never said that. All the Member for Couva South was saying is, “Listen, I cannot guarantee your safety.” But here we have a man saying—not that he cannot guarantee the Member’s safety—but, “I am going to prevent you from being on any political platform, and if you feel I am joking, you know what? You just try.”

Mr. Speaker, having said that in this kind of environment where there is violence, imagine someone who feels so passionate and committed to Dr. Joe Laquis, or whatever Dr. Joe Laquis might represent—even if it is the balisier and PNM—that someone could misinterpret these words, or interpret them according to how they were said, and decide that if they see the Member for Caroni East, it would be okay for them to act on behalf of the people—who may not even hire them—to do something to him. This is the kind of thing that is happening in Trinidad and Tobago now, and people are giving press releases and saying these things, all because someone was prepared to be frank, open and forthright and say, “Listen, I have evidence and I am willing to do my job.”

Mr. Speaker, do you know what is another problem? Witnesses or persons who have information that is relevant on sensitive issues may find themselves now in a position saying, “If the Member for Caroni East was willing to give information and he is threatened well, maybe, if I want to give information on any

other issue, I would be threatened too. I better keep my mouth shut.” Therefore, the criminals would be laughing at us again. The criminals are just being made to laugh at us. They hold us in contempt and they scorn us. What these criminals are saying is, “Do what you want, say what you want, this Government, the PNM, our friends, will let us get away with it.”

Mr. Speaker, that is why, on September 14, 2002 in the *Guardian* newspaper, one could understand why the Member for San Fernando East—Prime Minister as he then was and as he is now—said “No need for panic”. In spite of all that was going on with respect to crime, the Prime Minister said that there was “No need for panic”. Mr. Speaker, I can tell you that for everyone who did not panic based on the advice of the hon. Member for San Fernando East, or remained calm, based on the advice of the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation they either migrated or are now shaking in their boots because they have recognized—like all of us—that we have been misled.

Mr. Speaker, do you know what is even more worrying and why it forms part of this Motion? The Prime Minister of the country is head of the National Security Council and the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation also sits on that council. One would have thought that when very important matters are being discussed such as measures to be implemented to deal with crime, the Prime Minister, as the Chairman of the National Security Council, should, at least, know what is happening in the very important Ministry of National Security and Rehabilitation.

What was amazing and unbelievable—I know it is almost clichéd now this afternoon—is when I read a story by Jada Loutoo in *The Trinidad Guardian* newspaper dated August 13, 2002 headlined: “PM in the dark about kidnapping expert”. So here we had Thomas Clayton, the kidnapping expert, negotiating fees with Minister Chin Lee, and that in itself was a problem, because Clayton said that he was not being paid, and Minister Chin Lee quoted a figure of \$250,000 and no one knew what was going on. So then one reads in the newspaper where Clayton was saying that he was not being paid and, on the other hand, Minister Chin Lee was saying that they were negotiating fees. One would have thought that the Prime Minister of the country would have come forward and removed the ambiguity and clarified the situation, but what the Prime Minister of the country came and said was, “PM in the dark about kidnapping expert”. In that article the hon. Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East was quoted as saying:

“He said he had not asked National Security Minister Howard Chin Lee for any details.

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‘I do not know,’ he said.

‘I did not ask him (Chin Lee) about details,’ ...

Manning said a Cabinet decision was not necessary for somebody to visit T&T.”

Well, I agree that a Cabinet decision is not necessary for anyone to visit Trinidad and Tobago, but this was not “anybody”; this was “somebody”, and this “somebody” was Thomas Clayton who was deemed to be a person who could solve our problems. In fact, when Clayton left these shores he said that we were doing very well. I would like to know if Mr. Clayton comes back to Trinidad and Tobago, if he is going to say that he is really pleased with what is going on here in our country.

Mr. Speaker, we have been talking about some of the unfortunate utterances that persons belonging to the PNM have been making with respect to this entire criminal activity that we are all faced with. One of the unfortunate utterances made by the hon. Prime Minister, the Member for San Fernando East, was reported in the *Saturday Express* dated September 07, 2002, which is a story by Sateesh Maharaj, and the headline reads: “Manning sees politics in kidnap spree”, and it says:

“Prime Minister Patrick Manning said yesterday he believed the recent upsurge in kidnappings was an attempt to create an unsafe atmosphere in the country in the run-up to the October 7 general election.

Manning said: ‘Right now the Government is having another look at our approach to this matter. I propose to address this matter publicly very shortly.’

‘You must understand,’ he said, ‘that part of the solution to it is a legislative solution. Kidnapping is not a criminal offence in that sense.’”

Mr. Speaker, even then, it was clear that the hon. Prime Minister and Member for San Fernando East, did not even understand that kidnapping was a criminal offence, because in that article he said that kidnapping was not a criminal offence in that sense. So even then there was the suggestion that the kidnappings that were taking place in Trinidad and Tobago were part of a political agenda, and an assurance was given by the Prime Minister and the hon. Member for San Fernando East that we should not panic, because he was sure that after the 2002 election, kidnappings would no longer be a problem facing this country.

Mr. Speaker, and what happened after the 2002 election? We are in a situation today, in May 2003, where kidnappings have gone out of control and everyone

now is begging and pleading with kidnappers to “please release the children and those persons that they have taken”. And when one reaches this point, if we do not turn it around now, we would all be living in jail, and we would all be regretting—not just UNC supporters, but even PNM supporters—that fateful day in 2002 when they enabled the PNM to become the Government of Trinidad and Tobago. [*Desk thumping*] The people would then go back—as they are regretting it now—and say, “How could a former President of Trinidad and Tobago do this to us?” We should not live a life of regret, if there is enough that we could do now to turn around the situation.

I am one of those persons when I am able to get an opportunity to refer to something, I do so. I remember talking about Abu Bakr about-face by Manning, where after the Prime Minister had promised to give the land to the Jamaat al Muslimeen, he found himself in a situation where he had to literally ask back for the land. When one looks at that picture, one really sees senior Members of the Cabinet looking ashamed at what took place and almost asking themselves: “How could this deal be made with someone who was clearly a person who had committed an act of atrocity against this nation?”

There are many people in this country who think that the utterances of Yasin Abu Bakr, the leader of the Jamaat al Muslimeen, ought to be ignored or taken lightly, and there are others in society who remembered Yasin Abu Bakr and his followers had committed an offence what I describe as an act of treason, in 1990. There are many people who do not know the content of that proposal or agreement that was made or suggested by Yasin Abu Bakr as to what ought to have been done, or what were the man’s terms in order—

Mr. Valley: Read it!

Miss G. Lucky: I want the hon. Member for Diego Martin Central to know that I armed myself with the authority, and I have brought it here to read it. I did my own personal survey, and I have asked people over the last two weeks if they knew that Yasin Abu Bakr wanted to be the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and they said to me, “No way, he never wanted to be the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation”, and then one person said to me, “Gillian, what nonsense are you talking, he does not want to be the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation, he is the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation today.” When one looks back, one realizes how many persons are turning a blind eye to the kind of activity that is taking place in this country by members of the Jamaat al Muslimeen. One also realizes what Abu Bakr asked for in 1990 has become his reality. Mr. Speaker, you will remember that the PNM said

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they care and they deliver. The PNM cared so much that it has delivered to Yasin Abu Bakr, exactly what he wanted.

I am quoting now from *The West Indian Law Reports*. It is a case called: *The Attorney General and another versus Phillip (Lennox) and others*. Many people may not know that Lennox Phillip is Yasin Abu Bakr. This case actually dealt with the whole issue of the validity of the amnesty, and it was reported in *The West Indian Reports* for young children and generations to come to read, see and feel what one man had caused. This is stated on page 464 at paragraphs “(a) to (c)”, and the Privy Council made reference to the major points of agreement, which was actually a document. It says that major points of agreement, a letter of resignation by the Prime Minister and a letter appointing Mr. Dookeran as Acting Prime Minister, which was signed by 16 Members of Parliament who were detained. In addition to referring to the letter of resignation and the letter appointing—

Mr. Speaker: Member, would you be winding up shortly? Your speaking time has just about expired.

Miss. G. Lucky: Mr. Speaker, in about five minutes.

Mr. Speaker: No, I cannot. I could allow you maybe a minute.

Miss G. Lucky: Mr. Speaker, on this point, I just want to read then the part of that agreement which was included in the request, and that was the appointment of a Senator from the Jamaat al Muslimeen and for Abu Bakr to be appointed Minister of National Security, and in 1990 that was being requested.

Mr. Speaker, as I wind up, I just want to refer to this Motion and indicate that with crime there could be no compromise. If this Government is serious about its care for all citizens of Trinidad and Tobago, then it would have no problem, in the first instance, of getting rid of the present Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and, secondly, forming a group with persons who know how to fight crime, in order to come up with an action plan that would fight the escalating crime in Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Speaker, I beg to move.

Mr. S. Panday: Mr. Speaker, I beg to second the Motion and reserve my right to speak.

Question proposed.

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Members, before I take my seat, let me indicate to you that there was—as you would have observed—a dip in the electricity supply and,

as a result, the compressor is down. It is being repaired at the moment, so there is a slight discomfort in the House, but I am sure that it is being repaired.

The Minister of Legal Affairs (Hon. Camille Robinson-Regis): Mr. Speaker, the Member of Parliament for Pointe-a-Pierre, the mover of this Motion, is clearly at variance with the leader of the party to which she belongs. In the Motion before us today, the Member of Parliament is asking for the immediate passing and implementation of the provisions of the Police Service Reform Bills. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Manning: That is the first mistake the Member made.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, the situation that the Member of Parliament for Pointe-a-Pierre has described in the Motion where the request was made, and I quote:

“And be it further resolved that a committee be formed comprising persons selected by the Government in consultation with the Opposition to formulate an action plan to fight escalating crime in Trinidad and Tobago.”

Mr. Speaker, that is exactly what happened when the Police Service Reform Bills were drafted, and that was the mechanism that was used to solve escalating crime between 1996 and 2001. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Speaker, if you would recall, the history of the Police Service Reform Bills would show that in the year 1999, it was the then Leader of the Opposition, the current Prime Minister of Trinidad and Tobago—in circumstances where crime was escalating to unbelievable proportions, where a prisoner had escaped, and where certain revelations came out from Justice Hosein’s commission of enquiry—immediately approached the then Prime Minister and asked for a bipartisan approach to solving this situation in relation to crime. The revelations of Justice Hosein’s commission of enquiry and the fact that the then government continued in breach of section 4(a) of the Constitution, and exhibited absolutely no clue as to how to preserve life, or how to ensure security of the person, the Leader of the Opposition, felt that it was incumbent on the Opposition to assist the government in dealing with an escalation in crime that had gone completely out of control.

The mover of the Motion says in the Motion that what we need is a committee to come together to formulate an action plan. Before I go even further, I want to pose the question: What happened to that \$5 million action plan that was sent to the then government by Sen. Prof. Deosaran? Mr. Speaker, absolutely nothing took place. We on this side are clear in our view that during the time of—

Mr. Speaker: Member for Couva South, would you please take your seat? The Member is on her feet.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, during the time that the Opposition was in government there was no policy in place. The then government was without direction and leadership, and they immediately accepted the proposal that was posited by the then Leader of the Opposition, and I repeat, that resulted in a bipartisan team being set up, and the establishment of a technical team which comprised persons selected by the government in consultation with the Opposition, and that team produced the current legislation which the Opposition is now opposing. The Member for Couva North is on record as saying that these Bills would not get their support unless there is constitutional reform, an issue that was never raised by that side during the last election campaign.

It is passing strange that there is a certain level of hypocrisy that comes with this Motion. The Opposition said that the country must wait before we could get their support for the passing of these Bills, and we have been waiting since 1999—because that is when this whole process started—2000, 2001, 2002 and we are now in the year 2003. The Member of Parliament for Pointe-a-Pierre comes to this Parliament and says that there is an escalation in kidnappings; that citizens are at risk; and they are of the view that nothing is happening as it relates to the crime situation in the country. They are the ones who are holding this country to ransom; they are the ones who operated for the period 1996—2001 with absolutely no idea, no direction and no leadership as it relates to the solutions to crime. Mr. Speaker, I repeat, this Motion is loaded with hypocrisy.

When the mover of the Motion stands in this Parliament and says to us that a boat came in at Pier I and nothing has been done by the Minister and the Minister should demit office, we ask the question on this side: When cocaine was found in a tank at a Senator's home, and when a missile was found in a water tank at a Senator's home, is it not the same Senator who now sits in the Parliament of Trinidad and Tobago? Hypocrisy! Mr. Speaker, again, this Motion reeks with hypocrisy.

When the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre says to us that the Member for San Fernando East is encouraging people to beat other people by using the term, "licks for the UNC", we ask them the question: What was being done by the Member for Couva North when he said, "Do them before they do you" and, immediately upon the Member saying that members of the media were subjected to attacks. They never said anything that in any way apologized to members of the media for literally inciting their supporters.

The hypocrisy goes further, because when the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre reads the amnesty agreement that was signed into the record of this Parliament, the Member for St. Augustine and the Member of Couva South were part of the team that assisted in drafting that amnesty, and the Member for Couva North said, “Wake me up when it is over”—

Mr. Ramnath: Mr. Speaker, I want to take this opportunity to deny—

Mr. Imbert: Are you on a point of order?

Mr. Ramnath: You do not correct me! The Member is misleading the House. I never signed any document. I was a hostage and the Member is totally out of order to come and lie to the Parliament. If the Member does not know she should stay quiet!

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member for Couva South, please—

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, the record would show that the Member for Couva South was the Member of Parliament who took the document after it was signed outside to Mr. Carter, the Acting President at the time.

Mr. Ramnath: Mr. Speaker, I will not sit down and allow this—

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, are you on a Standing Order?

Mr. Ramnath: I do not know what Standing Order, but you cannot allow this. The Member is making accusations against a sitting Member of the House, and you want to use Standing Orders against me! [*Interruption*]

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, when the Speaker is standing you have to take your seat.

Mr. Ramnath: I do not have to do anything!

Mr. Speaker: But you have to take your seat.

Mr. Imbert: Go home!

Mr. Speaker: If you are on a point of order, claim your point of order.

Mr. Ramnath: My point of order is that the Member is misleading the House and the Member is telling a falsehood.

Mr. Speaker: Okay, that is your point of order.

Mr. Ramnath: And I did not carry any amnesty to any President of this country. I will not stand here and allow you or anyone to intimidate me! I was a hostage for six days and so was the Member for Chaguanas. You all are making

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people feel that this is a frivolous matter! [*Interruption*] Do not tell me what to do! “Yuh think you father leave this in a will for you.”

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, you have raised a point of order and I am ruling that you are out of order. Member, please continue.

Mr. Ramnath: Well, I do not expect otherwise.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, I will continue to make the point that whereas the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre has read into the record of the Parliament of Trinidad and Tobago that a particular document was used, and based on that document certain things were requested, I repeat, that the information is that the Member for Couva South was the one who took the document out—

Mr. Ramnath: Mr. Speaker, the Member continues to lie to the House! I will not tolerate the Member saying those things, which is a total untruth and fabrication.

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member for Couva South, please conduct yourself. You could, in fact, enter into the debate.

Mr. Ramnath: No Sir, Members are not allowed to lie and use their privileges to mislead and misinform the House.

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, you would have an opportunity, 75 minutes of it.

Mr. Ramnath: So you could get up and say anything you want in this House! What protection do I have when a Minister, in the presence of the media, is lying to the House?

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, please, you would have your 75 minutes, and if the debate continues like this I will suspend the sitting.

Mr. Ramnath: Well, I would leave too. You could suspend me if you want! I do not need to be here!

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Members, please, I appealed to Members at the beginning of the session to conduct themselves properly, and in accordance with the rules. Please, continue hon. Minister.

Mr. Ramnath: You continue to repeat yourself.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, it was in that document, which is in the records of the court that said it was the Member for St. Augustine who has been named, and it is clear that whereas they are saying, at this time, that Bakr was offered the position of Minister of National Security, they signed a

document—which is part of the court's records, and which was just read into the record of Parliament—that they were willing to offer Bakr the position of Minister of National Security. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Imbert: They had agreed to that.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, that is why I say continuously, without fear of contradiction that this is a Motion which reeks with hypocrisy. Hypocrisy in a situation where for the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago there was a murder in the Prime Minister's residence. [*Desk thumping*] Never before in the history of Trinidad and Tobago did anything like that happen. Mr. Speaker, for the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago, known criminals were sent up as candidates in a local government election. [*Desk thumping*] Mr. Speaker, for the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago, known criminals were sent for the Tobago House of Assembly election and this was all under the UNC when they were in government. [*Desk thumping*] And for the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago, a minister of government has been charged with the murder of a councillor, and for the first time in the history of Trinidad and Tobago, a sitting UNC councillor for Princes Town was charged along with two other persons with abducting someone. So when the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre stands in this Parliament—[*Interruption*]

Mr. Speaker: Order!

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, I think that took about a minute, so I am hoping that I would get my minute of injury time. When the Member stands there in a sanctimonious way and tells us, on this side, that we should join with them to form a committee, and that the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation should be removed; we want to remind them that this type of situation took place during their six years in government and that type of thing never happened under any PNM government in Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Speaker, in the same way that the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre talked about the tenure of the current Minister and reported crimes and solved crimes, I want to take this opportunity to talk about reported crimes and solved crimes during the tenure of the last Minister of National Security—if you would permit me, Mr. Speaker—just as a means of comparison.

In the year 2000, there were 119 reported murders and 64 were solved; in the year 2001, there were 150 reported murders and 65 were solved. With regard to woundings and shootings, in the year 2000, 385 were reported and 215 were

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solved; in 2001, 499 were reported and 223 were solved. With respect to rape and incest, in 2000, 535 cases were reported and 396 cases were solved; in 2001, 545 cases were reported and 383 cases were solved. With regard to robberies, 4,067 cases were reported and 713 solved; and in the year 2001, there were 4,273 cases reported and 689 cases were solved. With respect to larceny in dwelling houses, in 2002, 399 cases were reported and 66 cases were solved; in 2001, 323 cases were reported and 72 cases were solved, and the numbers have shown that under that administration—and whereas they are coming to us today and telling us about statistics, if they were not so hypocritical and so dishonest—the statistics showed where crime was on a consistent increase under their administration. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Speaker, whereas we have a Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation, who I will show subsequently, is working at achieving certain goals, they had a Minister of National Security who did absolutely nothing. The information that has come to us exhibits that the Minister of National Security in the last administration did not even attend to the office, and it was difficult for members of staff even to locate the minister in order to sign documents. Sometimes members of staff had to have documents signed on a golf course. We are not a government that would, for one day, condone a situation where a minister does not operate. We are a government, who by our very history, indicated that at all times ministers must adhere to what the Constitution ask of them.

I would like to make the point that this administration will never follow the example of governance set by the previous administration. It is well known that they operated for almost two years without a competent Minister of National Security. I am not alone when I say that the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation is operating within his portfolio, in order to set policy guidelines, and in order to grasp what his portfolio is all about.

Mr. Speaker, with your leave, I would like to read into the record of the Parliament, a letter dated May 09, 2003 from the United States Ambassador to the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation and I quote:

“Dear Minister Chin Lee,

I am pleased to thank you and your ministry for your invaluable assistance in responding to initiatives that concern the Embassy’s International Narcotics and Law Enforcement Programme and National Security for Trinidad and Tobago.

In particular, I wish to highlight your influence in overcoming delays, and your assistance in ensuring that this programme got off the ground. Clearly,

your knowledge of the very detailed aspects of this programme must have reduced the time it would otherwise have taken to arrive at a decision.

I have been advised, and I am certain that this has come about because of your engagement with the issue, your familiarity with technical aspects of the programme, and your desire to see the program work effectively.

The commitment and dedication that you have shown in serving your country will in time help you to bring the extremely difficult crime situation that you inherited under control. However, please understand that our experience suggests that you may have a long and difficult struggle ahead of you, and in order to succeed, you need the patience and support of all law-abiding Trinidadians.

Rest assured that the US Government will continue to assist your nation in this and other matters of mutual interest and importance.”

So, we are here today to repeat the point that this Motion reeks with hypocrisy. Imagine the Opposition is saying to us today, “Let us come together and form a committee and we would work together on an action plan.” These are the same persons who said to the NAR in 1995, “Let us come together and work together to form a government”, and within the shortest possible space of time they reneged on that agreement, just as they reneged on the Crowne Plaza agreement; just as they reneged on their support of their own Police Service Reform Bills; just as they will not now support the kidnapping legislation; just as they are not supporting the terrorism legislation; and just as they are no longer supporting the Caribbean Court of Justice.

Mr. Speaker, just an aside, remember they are the ones who, through their then Attorney General, without even the underpinnings of a Caribbean Court of Justice, rushed to the Privy Council and asked the Privy Council to no longer take our cases, and now they are saying that they would no longer support the very Caribbean Court of Justice. Mr. Speaker, hypocrisy at its highest! What they did through the very Member for Couva North was to go around the country trying to incite civil disobedience and talking about racism on a continuous basis with no evidence; just as in the same way, the Member for Caroni East jumped up in this Parliament and said that the Minister has not brought any evidence to support what he has said. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Singh: I do not understand what the Member is saying. I wrote to the hon. Prime Minister requesting to meet Mr. Lindquist, and I was told that I would be given that opportunity to meet Mr. Lindquist. I am awaiting a call from the

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Attorney General to meet Mr. Lindquist and to provide Mr. Lindquist with the necessary evidence. The Member knows about the evidence since her husband was in the Scott Drug Report. [*Interruption*]

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, it is the same way the Member gave the evidence to the United States Ambassador about the person who was in the United States doing all sorts of things. I am trusting that the Member will give Mr. Lindquist evidence about the desalination plant; evidence about InnCogen; evidence about the airport; and evidence about TTPost and the land that they are on now. I hope that the Member would be just as willing to give that evidence. [*Interruption*] I hope the Member would also be willing to give evidence on the \$10 million account, Shipwreck and all those other matters that the Member has personal knowledge about. I hope the Member would be very willing to give that evidence.

3.30 p.m.

Mr. Speaker, I repeat; crime did not start with this administration; crime did not start in December 2001. The issue of crime before this honourable House touches at the very core of governance, and in responding to any call for the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation to be removed, certain issues must be addressed. The question must be asked: How extensive is the national security responsibility? What is the role of any Minister in the execution of his portfolio? What is the nature of the task within the context of the national setting? How are security problems to be dealt with? What are the mechanisms for measuring the success of any issue of national security? What are the challenges that lie ahead? What is the role of the citizen in the solution to the crime problem?

It must be noted that the issue of national security goes far beyond the mere absence of crime in a society. Any government depends heavily on the operational expertise of all the various divisions of a ministry of national security, including the police service, the defence force, the fire services, the Forensic Sciences Centre, the National Emergency Management Agency, the cadet force and the immigration division.

Let me take this opportunity to point out that I am sure you would recall that during the period 1996—2001, the then administration said that if you give vehicles to the police service that would be the solution to the crime problem. I repeat. During that period there was an unprecedented escalation in crime. One hundred tainted vehicles were given. Mr. Speaker, if you would recall, with respect to crime itself, 100 Cherokee jeeps were given, and then it was said that only Motorola from a certain supplier would work in those jeeps; tainted with crime from the very outset.

Let me make the point that under this current administration—almost from day one—there has been every effort to ensure that programmes and projects aimed at attaining the goal of safety and security for the citizens of Trinidad and Tobago are put in place. This initiative became paramount in circumstances where, for the preceding five-year period, crime had escalated to unprecedented proportions. The Government of the day has worked assiduously at ensuring that the Ministry of National Security and Rehabilitation is equipped with state-of-the-art equipment; vehicles that can use the geographical directional modus, and also the creation of an increase in the numbers in the police service; an increase in the numbers in the defence force; and an increase in the numbers in the coast guard, all with the objective of ensuring that citizens can feel safe in Trinidad and Tobago. The Trinidad and Tobago Fire Service has also benefited from improvements, not only in their fleet, but also in the mechanisms that are used by computerizing their entire system.

Regarding training, there has been an increase in the scope and quality of police training to deal with all cases and, specifically, with cases of domestic violence, child abuse and kidnapping. The Anti-Kidnapping Squad of the police service was re-enforced in September 2002, and established as an independent unit of the service. In addition to that, the numbers in that squad were increased.

In June of this year, there is scheduled to be a course for participants from Trinidad and Tobago, Guyana and Suriname, to increase the capability of those who participate in that particular exercise in dealing with kidnapping issues. It is interesting that we are having participants from Trinidad and Tobago, Guyana and Suriname—because as the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre quoted today—the Prime Minister of St. Vincent and the Grenadines has said, quite clearly, that crime is not a problem that is singular to one country; it is a problem that is being faced by all the islands of this region. It is a worldwide problem. And the difference between what this Government is doing, and what was done by the last administration, is that we are putting policies and programmes in place to ensure that those who have to fight crime are capable of doing their job. [*Desk thumping*] Mr. Speaker, what has been said generally, is that we must equip those who have to fight crime, but as you well know, there is also the need to look at the social issues, and under this administration that is being dealt with.

Mr. Speaker, you would recall that for three years, between 1998 and 2001, the Civilian Conservation Corps was closed down; the youth camps were closed. All the facilities and programmes for young people in our country were halted under the last administration. [*Desk thumping*] In the year 2002, the Civilian

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Conservation Corps was resuscitated; the youth camp programmes have been revived, and there are a series of programmes which have been started by this administration, all for the young people of Trinidad and Tobago. [*Desk thumping*]

Let me just point out, that in relation to the Civilian Conservation Corps, from its introduction, under this administration to present, a total of 1,800 young persons have been incorporated within the Civilian Conservation Corps cycle of operation. [*Desk thumping*] That programme is being spread throughout Trinidad and Tobago. It is a structured programme. There is also a series of programmes that would encourage in our young people, an appreciation for each other; an appreciation for themselves; an appreciation for the country that is Trinidad and Tobago. That, Mr. Speaker, cannot be said for those on the other side who consistently talk about civil disobedience and exhibit disrespect, not only for each other, but also for the Parliament and all the institutions of Trinidad and Tobago; and a general lawlessness that they wish to inculcate into the young of this country. Whilst we are in Government and live in Trinidad and Tobago, we would fight tooth and nail against that. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Speaker, we are clear on this side that perhaps one of the most penetrative policies that has been introduced under this current administration is the introduction of prison reform and the transformation of the prison service. What has been very clear is that there is a large incidence of recidivism in the prison population, and we are clear in our belief that once the situation that exists now—where there is a return to a life of crime, and a return to prison and perpetrating criminal activity—can be dealt with, this administration would go a far way in attacking the problem of crime and criminal activity. [*Desk thumping*]

I want to take this opportunity to speak very briefly about the Kidnapping Bill which contains stiff penalties for those who are involved in this criminal act. Whereas those on the other side talk frivolously saying that it is a piece of legislation that was not well thought out; we are not going to support it; it is not the right thing to be doing at this time, Mr. Speaker, we are not alone; even the Chamber of Commerce; the Downtown Owners' and Merchants Association (DOMA) and several persons; even the parents of kidnapped victims have appealed impassionately to those on the other side to, please, support the Kidnapping Bill, because it is recognized that legislation is one of the ways of attacking any crime problem in any society. You can provide everything for the service to operate in a particular way, but when the perpetrator goes to court and he gets away, then you have not attacked the problem.

The current Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation has been working assiduously at ensuring that legislation and the policies are brought before the Government and that everything that needs to be done to attack this worldwide scourge is being done. So we on this side are consistent in our belief that the Motion is totally unfounded. Based on that belief, we on this side would like to amend the Motion. Mr. Speaker, with your leave we would like to posit the following amendment. We suggest that the third and fourth recitals and the resolutions be deleted. The resolutions would be replaced as follows:

Be it resolved that this honourable House support the Minister of National Security in his efforts to combat crime in Trinidad and Tobago.

So our Motion would read as follows:

Whereas section 4(a) of the Constitution of Trinidad and Tobago preserves the right of the individual to life, liberty, security of the person and enjoyment of property and the right not to be deprived thereof, except by due process of law; and

And whereas the Minister of National Security is specifically responsible for formulating policy to deal with the issue of National Security and is a key member of the National Security Council of Trinidad and Tobago which is chaired by the Prime Minister;

Be it resolved that this honourable House support the Minister of National Security in his efforts to combat crime. [*Desk thumping*]

Mr. Speaker, that is our proposed amendment.

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Member, may I remind you that you have to circulate your amendment in writing, and it needs a seconder.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, we are aware. Thank you very much.

The Opposition continues—almost on a daily basis—to play politics with the serious issue of crime, and this has been their history as their leader, as usual, continues to blame everyone but themselves for crime. Let me indicate that this is, in fact, their history. In the *Newsday* of July 23, 1994, the then Leader of the Opposition blamed the Chamber of Commerce and the Government for the spiralling crime rate. When they got into government it was that same hon. Member who stood and said—with his hands in the air—that there is nothing he can do about crime. [*Desk thumping*]

In addition to that, in 1999, it was that same hon. Member who, when talking at Kabir Pant said, “Maybe we should sit and talk with the criminals and ask them

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not to perpetrate the crimes.” Mr. Speaker, it is that same hon. Member for Couva North.

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Members, the speaking time of the hon. Member has expired.

Motion made, That the hon. Member’s speaking time be extended by 30 minutes. [*Hon. K. Valley*]

Question put and agreed to.

Hon. C. Robinson-Regis: Mr. Speaker, the hon. Member who moved the Motion said that we on this side have glorified criminal activity, but it was after the Member for Couva North commended one of his Ministers—after he brandished a gun and called him his best Minister—that glorification of persons in high office who were acting inappropriately started. We on this side have never and would never glorify any criminal activity. [*Desk thumping*] The hon. Member for Pointe-a-Pierre states that she spent nine years in the Director of Public Prosecution's office; I think it was the year 2000. During that period I am sure the hon. Member did not sit there twiddling her thumbs. Obviously, crime was taking place during the nine years spent in the DPP’s office.

I want to just remind those on the other side that in the same way the Member for Pointe-a-Pierre stood in this honourable House and read headlines for the year 2003 in relation to criminal activity, I would like to just pick two years under the last administration and read one month of criminal activity. It reads:

December 01, 1998: “six teens on murder charge, stabbing 17 year old for a chain after bazaar at Barataria.” December 02, 1998: “three babies murdered; house burnt in Morvant; family calls on Prime Minister, Basdeo Panday, to fulfil his initial promise when first house destroyed to help them rebuild their lives and their children's childhood. Panday said, ‘it is a time of hope, growth and excitement; tragedy can stunt that growth and transform lives into deep depression and finally into hopelessness.’ He pledged to do whatever he could for the young survivor and to give his mother every opportunity to rebuild the lives of herself and her son.”

Our information is that nothing concrete was ever done, Mr. Speaker. In the same way that Sean St. Clair, the adopted son, was left to eke out a living at the dump; that was the same child who was adopted and absolutely nothing was done.

The Member for Chaguanas also promised by saying, “anything you want just ask”; 20 months later when fire destroyed that family's house again, absolutely nothing had been done.

December 08, 1998:

Minister's daughter raped: December 10, 1998: Kidnapped and killed; body found in peas patch; a 17-year-old relative and a 25-year-old charged.

December 11, 1998:

Unarmed grocery packer shot in back three times and killed.

December 12, 1998:

Outgunned; bandits killed druggist outside bank in Arima.

December 15, 1998:

“Two more women raped in Arima, bringing the number to 24 rapes in six weeks.

December 16, 1998:

“Two murdered in Arima in 12 hours;

December 17, 1998:

“Bank fraud rising; increasing number of criminals attempting to defraud;

December 18, 1998:

“Danger zone; most crimes committed in Arima and St. Joseph; police grounded; no vehicles; living in the East today has become a risky business; 24 murders; 42 woundings; 122 rapes; 750 robberies; 1,450 break-ins;

December 22, 1998:

22 police guns missing.

December 23, 1998:

Highway robberies on the rampage;

December 24th, 1998:

Bandits on a spree.

December 26, 1998:

Family grieves, young father 23 years stabbed to death after buying Christmas gift for his baby son.

December 27, 1998;

Cops search for girl nine years old after she went on an errand.

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December 31, 1998:

New Year wish for Caroni (1975) Limited; stamp out corruption;

December 24, 1999: an unarmed guard shot dead in hold up; a 56 year old woman who was not sure she would be able to withdraw money with all the HYPE of millennium bug draws all her \$20,000 savings and is killed at home and the money stolen.

January 02, 2000.

Birthday girl, 16, head bashed in.

January 03, 2000:

4 chopped in house.

I could go on and on.

Mr. Speaker, we on this side are saying to those on the other side that we support the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation under this administration. It is passing strange that those on the other side have not been able to show that what is happening in this country is not a new phenomenon, except to indicate that under this administration, policies and programmes are being put in place and all that is necessary to ensure that the crime situation is held at an acceptable level.

We on this side make the point that whereas those on the other side continue to play politics with peoples' lives, we are working assiduously to ensure that the people of Trinidad and Tobago feel safe and they do not move forward feeling that nothing is being done, as they did under the last administration. We would continue to hold the esteem of the people because they know that under the People's National Movement, we would do nothing to endanger their lives, or to move them from a situation where they do not feel secure. Mr. Speaker, we support the Minister of National Security and Rehabilitation of the Government of the People's National Movement. [*Desk thumping*]

Thank you.

The Minister of Trade and Industry and Minister in the Ministry of Finance (Hon. Kenneth Valley): Mr. Speaker, I second the amendment moved by my colleague, the Member for Arouca South, and reserve my opportunity to speak at a later time.

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ADJOURNMENT

The Minister of Trade and Industry and Minister in the Ministry of Finance (Hon. Kenneth Valley): Mr. Speaker, I beg to move that the House do now adjourn to Friday, June 06, 2003 at 1.30 p.m. and to inform this House that on that day we would be doing—[*Interruption*] [*Crosstalk*]

Mr. Speaker: Order please! I would like to hear what the hon. Minister is saying.

Hon. K. Valley:—the tax amendment with respect to severance. [*Interruption*]

Mr. Ramnath: Today is Private Members' Day, why are you all abusing it!

Mr. Speaker: Hon. Members, before I put the Motion to this honourable House we have a Motion on the Adjournment from the Member for Caroni Central, Dr. Hamza Rafeeq. [*Crosstalk*] Please, hon. Members, the Member for Caroni Central is about to make his presentation.

**Preysal Community Centre
(Failure to Reconstruct)**

Dr. Hamza Rafeeq (Caroni Central): Mr. Speaker, sometime ago, I filed this matter to be debated on the adjournment of this honourable House, and that is the Government's failure to build a community centre in Preysal. There is a history to this matter which I would like to mention. First of all, Preysal, as many people would know, is a rural community with a population of about 6,000 persons. There is a functioning village council; there is a functioning women's group; there are functioning sports groups; there is a functioning Parent-Teacher Association, and the only public building in Preysal is a 55 year-old primary school. Mr. Speaker, as you know, Preysal has produced well-known sporting personalities including Inshan Ali, Theo Cuffy, Rangee Nanan and more recently Ravi Rampaul and Dinesh Ramdhin.

In 1994, as President of the village council at that time, I wrote to the Ministry of Community Development and Gender Affairs, making a plea for a community centre in Preysal. Also, as President of the village council, I suggested a site for the location of the community centre. We got a reply some time later that the Town and Country Planning Division had rejected that site, and shortly thereafter, I wrote a letter of objection to the Town and Country Planning Division giving eight grounds of objections. The Town and Country Planning Division visited various sites at Preysal, and then we got a letter from them saying that they had approved the site that we had suggested.

Preysal Community Centre
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In 1998 or thereabouts, the government of the day when we were in office, acquired the land for the construction of the community centre. In 2001, funds were allocated and the sod was turned some time in November 2001. I would like to read into the record a Cabinet Minute of 2001 which said that “Cabinet agreed to the construction of eight community centres and two community complexes in the undermentioned locations”—[*Interruption*]

Mr. Manning: You are stealing notes from the Cabinet.

Dr. H. Rafeeq: I got it in my mailbox—“St. Helena, Preysal, Thick Village, Pluck Road, Ecclesville, Maracas Bay, Cumuto and Jerningham Junction and community complexes at Morvant and Chaguanas.” This note was amended in the year 2002 when the PNM came into office and it was amended to read that “two more community centres would be added; one at Mon Repos and the other at Point Cumana, and the priority list would be changed.” It was further amended to read “that work begins in the construction of community centres at the undermentioned locations in order of priority; Mon Repos, Point Cumana and Maracas Bay.” It means then that all the other community centres that Cabinet had agreed to build and funds were allocated for, none of those centres was budgeted for.

To date, nothing has been done in the community of Preysal. As I said, the community of Preysal would like to have classes; they would like to have cultural activities; they would like to access programmes under the Ministry of Community Development and Gender Affairs, the Youth Training and Employment Partnership Programme (YTEPP) and so on.

Recently, a question was asked by the Member of Parliament for Chaguanas and the reply was that for this year’s budget only two community centres would be built. Mr. Speaker, I am saying that this is a clear case of discrimination because the construction of the community centre was budgeted for in an order of priority; the sod was turned—I am not too sure if the contract was awarded as well, and up to this day nothing has been done. I am making a plea, on behalf of the people of Preysal, for this Government to reconsider its priority list and put the Preysal Community Centre on the front burner so that before this year’s end, Preysal can enjoy what other communities are enjoying.

Thank you very much. [*Desk thumping*]

The Minister of Local Government (Hon. Jarrette Narine): Mr. Speaker, the People’s National Movement has always been a political organization in Government that recognizes the need for communities to have community

centres. Over the years we have built community centres throughout Trinidad and Tobago, and there are certain areas that the Unemployment Relief Programme, 1991 to 1995, built 22 community centres within one year. Among those were Radix in Mayaro, Lopinot, Indian Walk and other areas.

At this present time, the Ministry of Community Development and Gender Affairs has 22 community centres to be opened. The Member for Caroni Central did indicate, in true UNC style—went and turned the sod for the community centre without a contract during election time. This is the kind of thing that you would hear coming from the other side from time to time. The Member of Parliament for Caroni Central did speak about the sports personalities that came out of Preysal, and I am certain that all of us know Inshan Ali, Theodore Cuffy, Ranjee Nanan, Nirmal Nanan, Boya Sahadeo, nephew of the Member for Couva South.

It is during the PNM Government in 1994/1995 that we built a beautiful pavilion for Preysal sports club. [*Desk thumping*] The Member of Parliament is an honest man, and because we did not have the water connection we did not open it in 1995. The Minister of Works and Transport, at that time, the Member for Diego Martin East, felt that we should totally complete the place. Although the building was completed the water connection was not made. We did not open the centre, and as soon as the UNC came in the Member for Couva North went and put his name “The Preysal Pavilion” on the community centre as if he did anything. At that time the Member for Caroni Central indicated to me that he was going to invite me to that opening because the URP did it; it was really the PNM Government that did it. I attended the opening. Suffer it to be so. There is a plaque there that was unveiled one month after the election, giving the impression that that pavilion was built in one month.

Of course, there is need for a community centre, but there are areas that do not even have a village council or a community council to make representation on their behalf. That has been the habit in some of those areas in Central. They are not involved in any community work; they have not been involved in Best Village Competition; they have not been involved in the programmes that Government put there for communities. So, obviously, the PNM Government would take priority in putting community centres.

When we came into office on this occasion, we met Fanny Village Community Centre in Point Fortin, which was started in 1995, and for six years nothing was being done. We have completed Fanny Village Community Centre last year and it was opened; a beautiful centre in Fanny Village. The last UNC government started a community centre in St. Charles in the Naparima

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constituency and they built four walls and covered the roof for approximately \$800,000. The Member of Parliament for Naparima was present when we opened that community centre last year, completed by the People's National Movement Government for \$114,000. [*Desk thumping*] They spent \$800,000 to put up four walls. They gave it out in contract, and last year the Unemployment Relief Programme did it in-house. If the Member for Naparima is an honest man he would say so. He was there at the opening. At this point in time—St. Charles Community Centre, by the way, is in a total Opposition area—we have it in our heart that those centres that the UNC started and which remained in abeyance we are going to complete and open them.

Last week, I visited Dades Community Centre in Rio Claro. The very thing happened at Dades Community Centre in Rio Claro—you would remember that the electoral district for the local government in Dades, Rio Claro, was belonging to, unfortunately, Mr. Sumairsingh. So it was never completed. Since 1998, there was a board there stating when the centre would be open in 1999; 1999 passed; 2000 passed; 2001; it is when the PNM came the centre is now completed, and we are awaiting water connection. [*Desk thumping*] The village council there has written to the Prime Minister, asking him to come and open the centre, and also has written a letter to me thanking me that the URP was able to finish that centre.

Mr. Speaker, even the Preysal High School that they sited had real problems; because the school was sited in an area where there is a spring, and the person who was awarded the contract had many problems rectifying that situation. My information from the ministry is that we are not going to discriminate against anyone. We did not discriminate against the people of Naparima, neither the people of Rio Claro, where we have no support; we have completed those centres and your centre for Preysal would be included in the next budget to be completed.

Thank you very much.
