PRIVATE MEMBERS' BUSINESS

Motions:

1. **WHEREAS** section 4 of the Constitution of the Republic of Trinidad and Tobago, Chap. 1:01, affirms the principle of social justice including equality of opportunity and access to decent work;
AND WHEREAS the economic transformation and sustainable development of Trinidad and Tobago require coordinated and forward-looking national workforce planning;
AND WHEREAS persistent labour market mismatches, including skills gaps, youth unemployment, underemployment and misalignment between education and national economic priorities, continue to constrain productivity and economic participation;
AND WHEREAS international best practice among advanced economies demonstrates the value of integrated workforce development frameworks grounded in labour market intelligence and strong collaboration among government, industry, education and training institutions;

AND WHEREAS a National Workforce and Manpower Strategic Plan for Trinidad and Tobago should provide for coordinated labour market forecasting; alignment of education and technical and vocational training systems with national development priorities; strengthened industry-education partnerships and work-integrated learning opportunities; development of digital, critical-thinking, green economy and entrepreneurial skills; measures to address youth unemployment and participation disparities; and mechanisms for monitoring and evaluation, including periodic reporting to Parliament;

BE IT RESOLVED that this Senate calls upon the Government to prepare and table in Parliament, within twelve (12) months, a comprehensive National Workforce and Manpower Strategic Plan for Trinidad and Tobago, inclusive of a legislative and institutional framework.

2. **WHEREAS** Trinidad and Tobago's healthcare system relies predominantly on paper-based records;

AND WHEREAS the fragmentation of patient health information across public and private medical institutions owing to the absence of a unified, interoperable Electronic Medical Records system contributes to duplication of diagnostic procedures, delays in treatment and inefficient use of limited health resources, even more so in emergency cases;

AND WHEREAS digital transformation of health services is a stated priority of the Government of Trinidad and Tobago;

BE IT RESOLVED that this Senate calls upon the Government to develop a comprehensive policy and legislative framework for the development of a National Electronic Medical Records system to manage medical records and health data governance, including standards for the recording, processing, storage, protection and secure sharing of health information, including appropriate cybersecurity and data protection safeguards, interoperability standards, and phased implementation across public and private healthcare institutions;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Government introduce into Parliament, within twelve (12) months, comprehensive legislation to give effect to a national framework for medical records and health data governance.

3. **WHEREAS** forests constitute a critical national asset that supports the environmental, economic and social development of Trinidad and Tobago;

AND WHEREAS Trinidad and Tobago has established a legislative and policy framework for the protection and management of forests, wildlife, protected areas, watersheds and the environment, including the Forest Act, Chap. 66:01, the Conservation of Wildlife Act, Chap. 67:01, the State Lands Act, Chap. 57:01, and the Environmental Management Act, Chap. 35:05 and multiple policies aimed at forest and wildlife protection, biodiversity and most recently climate change;

AND WHEREAS evidence presented at Parliamentary Committee inquiries, and other public consultations, has highlighted ongoing concerns regarding deforestation, , biodiversity loss, habitat fragmentation, and the increasing impact of climate change on the natural environment and communities throughout Trinidad and Tobago;

BE IT RESOLVED that this Honourable Senate calls upon the Government to develop and table in Parliament, within twelve (12) months, an integrated, comprehensive National Forest Conservation and Reforestation Strategy for Trinidad and Tobago, including an implementation plan for the review and strengthening of existing legislation, policies and institutional arrangements relating to forests, protected areas, biodiversity conservation and watershed management.

Question No. 10 to the Minister of Homeland Security

With respect to the State's use of private security providers for the transportation of prisoners, can the Minister state:

- (i) how long has the State engaged private security providers for this purpose;
- (ii) what are the main reasons for the continued use of private security providers for this purpose;
- (iii) what is the total amount paid to private security providers for prisoner transportation during the last three (3) financial years, disaggregated by financial year and service provider;
- (iv) what assessments, if any, have been undertaken by the Ministry, to compare the continued use of private security providers with expanding the transport fleet and operational capacity of the Trinidad and Tobago Prison Service;
- (v) whether the Government intends to reduce its reliance on private security providers by expanding the transport fleet and operational capacity of the Prison Service; and
- (vi) if the answer to (v) is in the affirmative, the anticipated timeline for implementation?

Question No. 14 to the Minister of the People, Social Development and Family Services

With respect to the availability of social displacement statistics in Trinidad and Tobago, can the Minister state:

- (i) when was the last nationwide assessment of social displacement conducted;
- (ii) what is the estimated number of socially displaced persons nationwide, disaggregated by town/county/city;
- (iii) what are the principal causes of social displacement identified by the Ministry;
- (iv) how many State programmes are currently in place to provide emergency shelter, rehabilitation, and reintegration services to socially displaced persons; and
- (v) what measurable targets have been established by the Government to reduce social displacement over the next five (5) years?
